Hebrews 10.25 (Part Three)

Meeting together (Rm 1.11-12 'one another faith')

- Exercising our gifts in the body (Rm 12.5-7)
- Cultivate brotherly love (Rm 12.10)
- Cultivate <u>humility</u>, <u>associate</u> with the lowly (Rm 12.16)
- Care for one another [in the body] (1 Cor 12.14-26)
- **Enduring** one another in the body (Eph 4.1-4)

- Cultivating "body" language among one another (Eph 4.25-32)
- Cultivating Christian graces among one another (Col 3.12-17)
 - Encourage one another and build up one another [in light of the coming day of wrath] (1 Thess 5.9-11)

Cultivate *love* for one another (1 Thess 3.11-13)

Pray for one another, *confessing* your *sins* (Jas 5.13-16)

- Be hospitable to one another, loving one another (1 Pt 4.7-10) **Love** one another (1 Jn 3.11, cf. 3.23, 4.7, 4.11, 4.12, 2 Jn 5)
- To sum up:

 - All of these admonitions are personal All of these admonitions involve *corporate* life (you do these things
 - in relationship to others)
 - These admonitions assume church assembly without commanding church assembly

Heb 10.24 and let us consider how to stimulate one another

to love and good deeds, ²⁵ not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another; and all the more as you see the day drawing near.

- You cannot fulfill the exhortation "consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds" by forsaking the assembly
- You can only fulfill the exhortation by <u>interpersonal</u> involvement, in connection with the assembly
