Lessons about the Church

I've made my outline out of four summary propositions, and with each one I have a one-word summary of the summary. Each of these ideas are important for church ministry.

In a way, these are just four ideas, or "mini-sermons" that I think we should think about as we move on past this farewell address by Paul. I. Courage: The church advances through fearless ministry (18-21)

A. Key phrases

- 1. "serving the Lord ... with trials which came upon me through the plots of the Jews" (19)
- 2. "I did not shrink from declaring to you anything that was profitable"
- B. Key word: Courage "It is striking that Paul reminded the Ephesian elders of his trials through the plots of the Jews. The narrative of his Ephesian ministry in Acts does not relate any specific Jewish plot against him, although such plots occur frequently in the overall story of Paul's mission—at Pisidian Antioch, Iconium, Lystra,
 - Thessalonica, Berea, and Corinth."1

B. Key Word: Dedication ^{1 Cor 4.9-13} For, I think, God has exhibited us apostles last of all, as

men condemned to death; because we have become a spectacle to the world, both to angels and to men. 10 We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are prudent in Christ; we are weak, but you are strong; you are distinguished, but we are without honor. ¹¹ To this present hour we are both hungry and thirsty, and are poorly clothed, and are roughly treated, and are homeless; 12 and we toil, working with our own hands; when we are reviled, we bless; when we are persecuted, we endure; ¹³ when we are slandered, we try to conciliate; we have become as the scum of the world, the dregs of all things, even until now.

Each of these points will apply in our own circumstances in different ways, but they help us think about what concerned Paul for the churches as he looked forward into their future.
