#### I. Prelude: a host with Gentile connections A. Travel from Caesarea to Jerusalem (about 62 miles)

- 1. The word used in v. 15 suggests "saddling up" or "loading a pack horse"
- 2. If by horse, the journey might last two days
- B. A group of Caesareans accompany them 1. Going to Passover also?
- 2. Or to lead them to their host?

C. Host: Mnason of Cyprus

- 1. "a disciple of long standing" how long? Some suggest as far back as Pentecost

  - 2. Mnason: a decidedly Greek name
  - 3. From Cyprus, so at least a "Hellenized Jewish Christian"

4. Will host Paul and his cohort of mostly Gentiles – a logical choice

With these introductory words, we find Paul now in Jerusalem, with the trappings of his Gentile connections all around him (a sore spot for the Jews, including Jewish Christians as noted this morning)

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#### **Conclusion:**

Ep 2.1-8 ¶ And you were dead in your trespasses and sins, <sup>2</sup> in which you formerly walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, of the spirit that is now working in the sons of disobedience. <sup>3</sup> Among them we too all formerly lived in the lusts of our flesh, indulging the desires of the flesh and of the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, even as the rest. <sup>4</sup> But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, <sup>5</sup> even when we were dead in our transgressions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), <sup>6</sup> and raised us up with Him, and seated us with Him in the heavenly *places* in Christ Jesus, <sup>7</sup> so that in the ages to come He might show the surpassing riches of His grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. <sup>8</sup> For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, *it is* the gift of God;
