In 1920, a group of faithful pastors held a "pre-convention Convention" just before the annual meeting of the Northern Baptist Convention. They called themselves the "Fundamental Fellowship."

This meeting was one of the opening salvos in the "Fundamentalist-Modernist

Controversy" that shook the church world in the 1920s.

The Fundamentalist Fellowship largely protested the presence of unbelievers and Bible-deniers in the colleges and universities of the Northern Baptist Convention and on its mission board.

The Fundamentalist Fellowship lost the fight in the Northern Baptist Convention but continued to hold annual meetings and pursue fundamentalist ministry through all the ensuing years.

Our meeting this week was the  $101^{\rm st}$  such meeting, only interrupted by Covid in 2020 (I couldn't attend last year due to travel restrictions).
