We will turn to studying the message of Proverbs now, beginning with the call to acquire wisdom.

Pr 1.8 Hear, my son, your father's instruction And do not forsake your mother's teaching;

"Wisdom is for anyong who wants it. Fools and simpletons are invited by name."

"Wisdom is for anyone who wants it. Fools and simpletons are invited by name to its feast, which is as free as that of folly (9.4, 16)."

"wisdom comes in a person's relationship with God. It is not learned at universities. It is spiritual and practical, not intellectual."²

Though true wisdom belongs to those who follow the Lord, who does God

The son has a choice "The 'if' represents a decision that every young man must make. He can either go the way of Wisdom and find life, true love, and most importantly God, or he can turn his back on her and find only bitterness, isolation, and death. One cannot opt out of this decision by choosing a little of one and a little of the other."3 What heart attitudes must the son have in v. 1? Willingness to receive; desire to treasure How does a son prepare himself to receive wisdom? (2) Orient his inner man: open ears, incline heart What do the terms of vv. 3 & 4 imply about the search for wisdom? You must cry out for it, you must dig it out of base soils, like hidden treasure Where do you arrive at the end of this search? (5, cf. 9) At the fear of the Lord; at the knowledge of God Considering the consequences of wisdom and folly (2.6-22) If you truly receive wisdom, you know where it comes from. Wisdom gives good theology (6-8) How will wisdom guard you? (10-12) keep you from the path of evil The passage sees the young man delivered from two people who

embody folly in vv. 12-19. Who are they?

(12) the man who speaks perverse things [easy money]

(16) the strange woman [easy pleasure]

(12) speaking perverse things

How do these people lead young men astray?

(16) flattering with words
