"In the ancient world a seal was often a glob of wax with the mark of an official signet ring to designate the authenticity of the document and the authority behind it (as in the seals of Revelation 5–6). With property it could be an inscribed stone or a precious jewel to indicate ownership, and slaves or followers

of a patron deity often had a tattoo to indicate ownership and allegiance (as in the 'mark' of the saints in Revelation 7:4 and of

'mark,' showing that we belong to God, who has marked or sealed us as his treasured possession (see the commentary on 1:4, 11) and both watches over and protects us."1 The Holy Spirit, our seal, is literally "the Spirit of promise, the Holy one."
