The revelation of a "new order" (i.e. the Church) is the BIG IDEA of Ephesians,

and Paul will continue to reflect on it as we move to chapter 3.

a. Stewardship (NAU) = dispensation (KJV) [economy, English derivative]

"Administration (Gr. oikonomia, dispensation, v. 9; 1:10) here has the idea of the management of someone else's business (cf. 1 Cor. 9:17; Col. 1:25). Paul viewed God as in the process of dispensing His grace throughout history through various administrators. Paul's responsibility was to carry God's grace to all people but particularly to the

"Paul does all of this 'for you'—that is, the goal of his ministry is not self-aggrandizement but the salvation of the lost. He has no interest in what he might get out of it, only in what God can do through him for the benefit of the Gentiles. Ministry is not a job or a career; it is a joy and a privilege, a high calling and sign of divine grace for

all who are gifted to be a part of it."2
